As the Chairman of the City of Delafield Deer Management Committee I welcome the opportunity to work with the Town of Delafield to coordinate efforts. Thank you for inviting me to attend your meeting last month. In that regard I would like to invite Town representative(s) to attend our next Deer Management Committee meeting on July 15<sup>th</sup> at 6 pm. The agenda is attached.

We had a very successful program in 2018-19. We harvests over 102 deer through bow hunting and our sharp shooter program. We put up four bow stands on City Property and had an online sign-up of bow hunters reserve space. We placed tree stands at our city brush drop off area (1), two stands at the Lois Jensen Preserve (2 and 3), and stand at Oakwood Park (4). We had 108 bow hunter register for the program. We had over 50 deer taken by bow hunters, perhaps more that were not reported to us.

We promoted the public bow hunting on our website and at location hunting retailers. Hunters completed a Hunter Application online or at City Hall. If approved the hunters were instructed to go online and sign up for a time and location. We used a program at <a href="https://booknow.appointment-plus.com/yx4ltzbg/">https://booknow.appointment-plus.com/yx4ltzbg/</a> to have authorized hunters sign up to hunt from our city stands. They could use our nuisance tags or their own tags. Most used their own tags. The Sharpshooter program in March and April resulting in us filling all 50 nuisance tags from the DNR. All of the meat from our sharp shooter program went to local veterans, or other people wishing to receive venison. They were responsible for the processing.

I believe we have the beginnings of an effective program, but we need to work with surrounding communities to continue the effectiveness. I would be open to expanding our hunter registration to Town locations and hunters. Please let me know how you see us working together and who your contact person would be. Thank you. ### Commonly Asked Questions about the Delafield Deer Management Program

# Why do we need a deer management program? If people don't like deer, they should not have moved to a rural community like Delafield.

Due to the lack of natural predators, abundant cover, food and water, the population of the deer herd today is 10 times larger than it was in 1940. The estimated deer herd in the area is 40 to 50 deer per square mile. In our management unit the WI DNR's goal is 10 -15 deer per square mile. This would help to insure a healthy herd and reduce the risk of Lyme's disease, vehicle accidents and property damage. The Delafield Deer Management Committee is charged with creating and managing a program to reduce the herd over several years.

### I hear there is a deer contraceptive available. Why don't we develop a contraceptive program?

The DNR has not approved any type of contraceptive program. Any type of contraceptive program using PZP or other contraceptives would be experimental and need approval from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. According to Tami Ryan, Wildlife Health Program Section for the WI DRN, "The use of fertility control agents on wildlife as an operational control of nuisance populations will <u>not be permitted</u> until scientifically sound research has demonstrated that the control agents are safe and effective. The science for PZP just isn't there"!

### Doesn't the DNR believe culling through hunting is only a short-term way to control the herd?

The DNR believes that hunting is an effective method for reducing the herd. Kevin Wallenfang, Big Game Ecologist, Bureau of Wildlife Management at the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources added, "I can tell you that everything I've ever seen on the subject indicates that sterilization is extremely expense, labor intensive, and not a permanent solution. Your approach through the use of archery seasons is more reasonable, cost effective, and effective at reducing deer numbers."

### What are the main components of the Deer Management Program?

In cooperation with the WI DNR, the Deer Management Committee has determined that bow hunting can be an effective method to reduce the herd.

The committee will; encourage bow hunting on private property, seek safe locations on select city property for bow hunting, utilize nuisance permits from the DNR for deer management, and work with state and county officials to allow restricted hunting in county and state parks if appropriate.

### Why allow bow hunting? Is it safe?

97% of all bow hunters hunt from an elevated stand and are shooting arrows toward the ground for a safer shot. Last season, (2017) there were no bow deer hunting accidents from arrows in Wisconsin during the deer season.

### Can I prevent someone from bow hunting near my house?

Yes. The Wisconsin statue states that an owner of a building must allow the hunter to hunt within 100 yards of your building, otherwise the hunter is hunting illegally.

### Where will bow hunting be allowed in the City of Delafield?

By state law bow hunting is allowed on private property throughout the city subject to the restrictions, including the 100-yard requirement. That season started September 15, 2018 and runs through January 31st, 2019. The City of Delafield cannot ban bow hunting. The Deer Management Committee has identified three areas to place bow hunting stands for the public in 2018-19. One stand in the DelHart city property. Two stands in the Lois Jensen area (one on city property and one on DNR property.) And one stand on the north side of Oakwood Park. The Delafield Common Council approved the placement of bow hunting stands at these locations, subject to the approval of the Park & Recreation Committee and DelHart management. Bow hunting from these city sanctioned stands will start

on November 1, 2018 and run through January 31st, 2019. These stands are closed on Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year Day. The Deer Management Committee may close the hunting or restrict the hunting at other times.

How do you plan to deal with issues of hikers and the public conflicting with bow hunters on city lands?

That is a great question! The deer management committee will work to limit bow hunting at times that don't conflict with high public use. Signs will be placed at city locations educating the public that bow hunting is taking place. Hunters will only be able to register to use the city stands at times authorized by the committee. Signage at Nashotah Park worked well last year for their deer management program. Most bow hunting will take place on city property after the fall season of activities. Hunters on city stands must always wear blaze orange or pink!

Won't the deer from other towns just move in and replace the deer harvested in Delafield?

Since the state has approved less restrictive bow hunting laws, more and more bow hunters have converted to bow hunting. In fact, in 2016 the number of deer harvested by bow was 51%, exceeded the 49% from firearms. A natural increase in bow hunting in municipalities next to Delafield will help control the herd.

How can I sign up to participate in the deer hunting program?

If you are hunting on private property you must be licensed and follow state laws. To participate and receive nuisance tags from document. Hunters wishing to hunt from the city stands will be approved by the Deer Management Committee. Once approved the hunter will be directed to a special online reservation site to select location, time and dates to hunt.

How can I get a nuisance permit?

The city will award nuisance permits to hunters that have completed a full application with the city. The nuisance permits are non-sex specific. But hunters will only be issued a permit with the goal to harvest a doe before being awarded any additional permits for bucks or does. Hunters must show evidence that they harvested and registered a doe from either their state issued tags or the city awarded tags before receiving additional tags from the city. All deer taken with a city issued permit must be tested for CWD and registered with the DNR and the City of Delafield.

How old must one be to hunt? General age guidelines are available at the <a href="https://www.gowild.com">www.gowild.com</a> site. But to hunt on city property one must be over 18.

Where can we donate meat?

Several local meat processing facilities will accept deer for processing and donate the meat to an area food pantry. We encourage all hunters to harvest does as well as bucks and donate the meat for excess deer. One can go to the DNR site for locations. https://dnr.wi.gov/topic/hunt/documents/donation.pdf or go to

For the potential right to hunt from select City of Delafield sanctioned bow stands on city property and/or to request a state/city nuisance tag, one must complete this application. If approved, you will be notified by email when to pick up your permits and you will be directed to an online registration site where you can select locations and times to use available city bow stands. We encourage you to harvest does as well as bucks with the city issued nuisance tags. You agree to abide by all state statutes and DNR regulations pertaining to bow hunting, and I have completed a WI DNR approved hunter safety course. Additionally, if hunting from a city stand, you must wear blaze orange or pink. (same as the requirement for bow hunting during the gun deer season).

- 1. Only current licensed deer bow hunters, 18 or older, are allowed to participate on city sanctioned bow stands.
- 2. You must report via email to the Deer Management Chairperson, Wayne Dehn, what you harvested <a href="wdehn@ci.delafield.us.gov">wdehn@ci.delafield.us.gov</a> on city property or deer harvested using a nuisance tag. Harvest reports to the state and

- to the deer management committee must be made within 24 hours. All deer taken using a City Nuisance Tag must be tested for CWD. You must drop off the head at an approved DNR site (see <a href="www.dnr.wi.gov">www.dnr.wi.gov</a>).
- You may not keep the antiers of bucks harvested using a city/state issued nuisance tag. Any bucks taken with a nuisance tag must have the antiers removed and turned into the DNR office in Waukesha or Eagle, WI
- 4. Unused nuisance tags must be returned to the City of Delafield City Hall upon request.
- 5. Additionally, you agree to abide by all city ordinances pertaining to bow hunting in the City of Delafield. You acknowledge that you have received the "2018 Deer Harvest Regulations" from the City of Delafield and you will abide by all regulations and restrictions of the City of Delafield. You must report to the City of Delafield the results of your hunt and will present, the harvested deer for CWD testing. Under penalty of law, you swear that the information provided in this application is true & correct to the best of your knowledge & belief. You agree to the waiver of liability.
- 6. You HEREBY ASSUME ALL OF THE RISKS OF PARTICIPATING IN ANY/ALL ACTIVITIES ASSOCIATED WITH BOW HUNTING ON CITY OF DELAFIELD PROPERTY, including by way of example and not limitation, any risks that may arise from negligence or carelessness on the part of the persons or entities being released, from dangerous or defective equipment or property owned, maintained, or controlled by them, or because of their possible liability without fault. You certify that you are physically fit, have sufficiently prepared, trained and completed the WI DNR approved hunter education program for participation in this activity and have not been advised to not participate by a qualified medical professional. You certify that there are no health-related reasons or problems which preclude my participation in this activity. You acknowledge that this Accident Waiver and Release of Liability Form will be used by the event holders, sponsors, and organizers of the activity in which you may participate, and that it will govern your actions and responsibilities at said activity. Hi Mary,

Here are the nuisance deer permit conditions for using public hunters that will be on the permit for this year. These require hunters to follow all game laws, including weapon restrictions during bow season and all season closing dates. The permit conditions also only allow anterless deer harvest. There are a couple options that are available but not included in this permit as it stands: contracted sharpshooters and hunting after seasons close. Both of those are possible, but require much more oversight on the part of the Town. Hunting after seasons close especially will require very close coordination between the town and the select few land owners that would have hunting on their lands after seasons close. For reference, the bow season will close this year on January 31st, 2020.

Let me know if there are any questions on anything in here or if the Town is interested in hunting after the season or in contracting sharpshooters. I will wait to hear back from you before putting together the final permit or the hunter brochure, which will mostly consist of the permit conditions.

### Nuisance Deer Permit Conditions:

The permittee is authorized to shoot white-tailed deer on lands within the municipal boundaries. Consideration for additional deer to be taken via this permit will be based on success and availability of additional deer via a request sent to the DNR. All of the following conditions are the responsibility of the permittee to follow. It is also the permittees responsibility to ensure any contractors, cooperators, other individuals, or organizations that participate in any way with carrying out this permit also follow the conditions of the permit.

### GENERAL PERMIT REQUIREMENTS:

- Harvested deer must be registered by phone (844-426-3734) or online (gamereg.wi.gov) no later than 5pm the day after harvest.
- All adult deer must have heads removed and submitted to the DNR for CWD sampling. No head shots are allowed on adult deer, as that makes CWD sampling impossible. Data sheets must be filled out for each deer and a CWD medallion attached to the submitted head.
- A shooting log must be maintained summarizing the following information for ALL deer harvested regardless of their method of harvest (sharpshooters, hunters, etc.). This shooting log must be submitted to the DNR wildlife biologist within 2 weeks of the completion of culling annually.
  - Harvest authorization number
  - o CWD medallion number (if applicable)
  - Harvest date
  - o Harvest location
  - Deer age (fawn or adult)
  - Deer sex (male/female)
  - Disposition of the carcass (processor for food pantry, name of individual for individual donation, etc.)
- Failure to meet the conditions of this permit may result in denial of future permit requests.

### FOR DEER HARVESTED BY PUBLIC HUNTERS OR PRIVATE LANDOWNERS:

- ONLY antierless deer may be harvested.
- Hunters must have a deer license for the current deer season
- All season restrictions apply, including dates, weapon restrictions, baiting restrictions, and blaze orange requirements.

### DONATION INFORMATION

- All deer culled must be donated either to private individuals or food pantry.
- Deer donated to private individuals must also be given the respective CWD medallion with sample number (or CWD sample number if no medallion is available) to allow the individual to look up CWD test results, if applicable.
- Permittee must ensure all meat donated to a food pantry is held by the processor for 3 weeks or until CWD test results are completed to ensure no CWD positive meat is donated.

### ANNUAL REPORTING

- The complete shooting log must be submitted to the Waukesha Wildlife Biologist, Department of Natural Resources; 141 NW Barstow Street, Waukesha, WI 53188 within 14 days of the end of the shooting season. ### **REGULATION COMPLIANCE INFORMATION**

- The permittee shall designate listed employees or agents, authorized in writing, as sharpshooters who are permitted to shoot and kill deer. If non-contracted hunters are used the permittee must maintain a record of who is allowed to utilize the nuisance harvest authorizations.

### **Staff Recommendation:**



The Waukesha County Shoreland and Floodland Protection Ordinance currently requires that the lowest level of any residence must be at an elevation that is at least one (1) foot higher than the highest seasonal groundwater level, unless a variance from that requirement is obtained from the Waukesha County Board of Adjustment. Therefore, additional soil testing in the vicinity of any future proposed residence will be required to ensure compliance with this requirement. If the requirement regarding vertical separation distance from the highest seasonal groundwater level is modified by a future amendment to the Waukesha County Shoreland and Floodland Protection Ordinance, the requirement at the time of construction shall apply. All groundwater separation requirements set forth by the Town of Delafield must also be complied with.

### FLOODPLAIN AREA PRESERVATION RESTRICTIONS

- Grading, filling and removal of topsoil or other earthen materials are prohibited, unless specifically authorized by the municipality in which this land is located and, if applicable, the Waukesha County Department of Parks and Land Use, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the Army Corps of Engineers.
- 2) The removal or destruction of any vegetative cover, i.e., trees, shrubs, grasses, etc., is prohibited, with the exception that invasive, dead, diseased, or dying vegetation may be removed and/or an access and viewing corridor may be created with approval from the Waukesha County Department of Parks and Land Use-Planning and Zoning Division.
- 3) The introduction of plant material not indigenous to the existing environment is prohibited.
- 4) The construction of ponds is prohibited.
- 5) The construction of buildings is prohibited.
